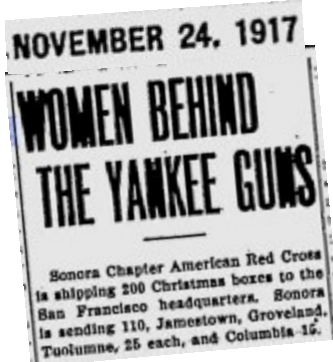

President's Message by Phil VanSwoll

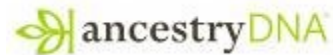

1914-1918

For the last two years, Pat Perry has been working on a project to document how the war affected Tuolumne County. In addition to researching local records, she has done research at the National Archives in St. Louis, Missouri and the World War I Museum in Kansas City, Missouri. She has discovered that at least thirty men with ties to Tuolumne County died during the war or after, from the effects of the war. She is currently developing biographies of each man, often with the assistance of family members who have been willing to share their memories, photographs, and letters from the men. The Tuolumne County Museum has a special exhibit about the war, including the influenza epidemic which killed many at home and in the service during the fall of 1918.

NEW AT FAMILY SEARCH

If you're looking for your Dutch ancestors, your search has just become much easier. Family Search has published 29 million new, free historical records from the Netherlands, making it easier than ever to trace your Dutch roots. The freely searchable collections are comprised of birth, baptism, marriage, death, church, notarial, army service and passenger list records and population registers. Some of the records date back to 1564. There are also 12 free learning courses to help those searching Dutch ancestry. DO YOU NEED HELP GETTING STARTED WITH YOUR GENEALOGY? HAVE YOU BEEN DOING GENEALOGY FOR YEARS AND HAVE HIT A “BRICK WALL”?

Mentors ~ also known as experienced and trusted advisers ~ are available during the one-half hour prior to each TCGS general meeting (except May and December). Bring the information you have discovered about your ancestors (pedigree chart, family group sheet, etc.) and allow our mentors to assist you. Who knows? YOUR questions may help someone else!

FORMULAS AND PATTERNS

A Google search will undoubtedly give you an easier way to calculate results for these questions, but the following formulas and patterns could be helpful if you only have a pencil and paper:

8870 FORMULA:

Using the 8870 formula to ascertain a birth date can be a tremendous help to the genealogist when checking the tombstone or death record dates. If a tombstone or death record shows that a person died May 6, 1889 and was 71 years, 7 months and 9 days old, but no date of birth is listed, in order to correctly arrive at the birth date one has only to use the 8870 formula to quickly get the date of birth, rather than taking time to count backward.

Subtract	<u>- 710709</u>	71 yrs. 7 mos. 9 days
	18179797	
Subtract	<u>- 8870</u>	constant
	18170927	born 1817 Sept 27

IF YOU WANT TO FIND OUT WHICH DAY YOU WERE BORN:

1. Take the last two figures of the year concerned.
2. Add 1/4 of this number, ignoring any remainder.
3. Add the day of the month.
4. Add the following number, according to the month-

Jan—1 (or in a leap year, 0)	Jul—0
Feb—4 (or in a leap year, 3)	Aug—3
Mar—4	Sep—6
Apr—0	Oct—1
May—2	Nov—4
Jun—5	Dec—6
5. Add for 1700s—4, 1800s—2, 1900s—0, 2000s—6
6. Divide total by 7.
7. The remainder gives the day of the week: 1=Sunday, 2=Monday, 3=Tuesday, 4=Wednesday, 5=Thursday, 6=Friday, and 0 = Saturday.

For example, a person was born on April 21, 1926. To find the day, add 26, 6, 21, 0, 0. Answer = 53. Divide by 7. Answer = 7, remainder 4. So the person was born on a Wednesday.

HOW TO FIGURE BIRTHDATES

Often tombstones have a notation such as: "Died 15 June 1872, Age 77 years, 10 months, 3 days." How do you determine the correct birthdate?

First, make the sequence read days, months, years: thus 15-6-1872 minus 3-10-77.

Since the 10th month cannot be subtracted from the sixth, borrow 12 months from the year of death, making the year 1871 and the month 18. (If you borrow from the month to make days, borrow 30 days, even though the month might have 31.)

The equation now looks like: 15-18-1871 minus 3-10-77. Begin the calculations on the right hand side. Therefore, 77 years from 1871 means that the person was born in 1794. Subtracting 10 months from 18 gives you eight months, or August. So the correct date of birth was 12 August 1794.

HISTORIC CAUSES OF DEATH

From Terry Cox and Newspapers.com:

Finding the historic obituary for your ancestor on Newspapers.com is like hitting the jackpot in genealogical research. Sometimes the cause of death is something we've never heard of. Here's a list of historic causes of death and their modern equivalents:

- Ague: *Malarial fever*
- Apoplexy: *Unconsciousness resulting from a cerebral hemorrhage or stroke*
- Brain Fever: *Meningitis*
- Bright's Disease: *Kidney failure*
- Childbed: *Fever due to an infection after childbirth*
- Consumption: *Tuberculosis*
- Canine Madness: *Rabies caused by the bite of an animal*
- Chin Cough: *Whooping cough*
- Diphtheria: *Contagious disease of the throat*
- Dyspepsia: *Indigestion and heartburn*
- Dropsy: *Edema caused by kidney or heart disease*
- Falling Sickness: *Epilepsy*
- Inanition: *Starvation*
- Lockjaw: *Tetanus disease that affects muscles in the neck and jaw*
- Milk Leg: *Painful swelling after giving birth caused by thrombophlebitis in the femoral vein*
- Mania: *Dementia*
- Mania-a-potu: *A mental disorder caused by alcoholism*
- Quinsy: *Tonsillitis*
- Ship Fever: *Typhus*
- Spotted Fever: *Meningitis or typhus*
